

Statements required in notice if the proposed tax rate exceeds the no-new-revenue tax rate but does not exceed the voter-approval tax rate, as prescribed by Tax Code §26.06(b-2).

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON TAX INCREASE

This notice only applies to a taxing unit other than a special taxing unit or municipality with a population of less than 30,000, regardless of whether it is a special taxing unit.

The no-new-revenue tax rate is the tax rate for the 2022 tax year that will raise the same amount of property tax revenue for Fannin County from the same properties in both the 2021 tax year and the 2022 tax year.

The voter-approval tax rate is the highest tax rate that Fannin County may adopt without holding an election to seek voter approval of the rate.

No-New-Revenue Maintenance and Operations Rate Adjustments

State Criminal Justice Mandate (counties)

The Fannin County Auditor certifies that Fannin County has spent \$ 0 in the previous 12 months for the maintenance and operations cost of keeping inmates sentenced to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. Fannin County Sheriff has provided Fannin information on these costs, minus the state revenues received for the reimbursement of such costs.

This increased the no-new-revenue maintenance and operations rate by 0 /\$100.

Indigent Health Care Compensation Expenditures (counties)

The Fannin County spent \$ 258,681 from July 1 2021 to June 30 2022 on indigent health care compensation procedures at the increased minimum eligibility standards, less the amount of state assistance.

For current tax year, the amount of increase above last year's enhanced indigent health care expenditures is \$ -115,282.

This increased the no-new-revenue maintenance and operations rate by 0 /\$100.

Indigent Defense Compensation Expenditures (counties)

The Fannin County spent \$ 1,039,719 from July 1 2021 to June 30 2022 to provide appointed counsel for indigent individuals in criminal or civil proceedings in accordance with the schedule of fees adopted under Article 26.05, Code of Criminal Procedure, and to fund the operations of a public defender's office under Article 26.044, Code of Criminal Procedure, less the amount of any state grants received. For current tax year, the amount of increase above last year's enhanced indigent defense compensation expenditures is \$ 135,718.

This increased the no-new-revenue maintenance and operations rate by 0.001422 /\$100.

Eligible County Hospital Expenditures (cities and counties)

The Fannin County spent \$ 0 from July 1 2021 to June 30 2022 on expenditures to maintain and operate an eligible county hospital.

For current tax year, the amount of increase above last year's eligible county hospital expenditures is \$ 0.

This increased the no-new revenue maintenance and operations rate by 0 /\$100.
